



FISH HIGHWAY

Overhanging trees shade the water, keeping it cool, and their root mass creates caves for shelter.



Gravelly and sandy bottom provides the conditions necessary for spawning beds. Fast flowing water provides oxygen needed to nourish the eggs. Sandy Creek is home to 54 species of fish.

DRIVEN TO SPAWN

Some of the species of fish found in Lake Ontario travel up this stream to spawn (lay eggs). The young fish return to the lake after they hatch. Other species live their entire lives and reproduce in the stream. The resulting abundance of small fish does not go unnoticed by the many species of birds that feed on them.



Belted Kingfisher
Spies fish from an overhanging limb, plunges into the water, beak first to grab it, and flies back to the limb to eat it.



Great Blue Heron
Stalks the shallow with slow motion stealth, spears fish with lightning quick lunge, and swallows them whole.



Hooded Merganser
Dives below the surface, swims underwater, chases fish, and grabs them with its serrated bill.
